

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



Record Book Information

As the 4-H year comes to an end it is important to remember that all members have the opportunity to earn year stripes and pins or even to earn Sparks Achievement Pins (New Achievement Record Book Forms) or Star Ranks (Old Record Book). Ask your club leader for record book submission deadline.

Minimum Requirement to receive annual year pin and stripe:

Primary Members (5-8 year olds): No Requirements

Regular Members (9-18 year olds): Complete a project: Attended at least 6 hours of instruction minimum and completed your Annual Project Report form (APR).

Requirements to earn 100% Attendance, sparks awards, star ranks, leadership stripe or medal: (Must be a Regular Member-Not eligible for Primary Members)

Complete a full record book to be submitted to your club.

Record Book with Achievement Program: Sparks Achievement Report or Emerald Star Report Forms, 4-H Story, Annual Project Report (APR) for each project completed, Leadership Report Form (If you had a leadership role (VMO Officer, Club Officer, Jr. Leader, Teen Leader, County Committee, State committee, etc.) and a 4-H Resume (Senior Members Only).

OR

Record Book with Star Rank Program: (*to be completing this record book type you must have earned a Bronze Star by the end of the 2022-2023 Program Year) Personal Development Form (PDR), 4-H Story, Annual Project Report (APR) for all projects completed, Leadership Development Report (If you had a leadership role), and a 4-H Resume (Senior Members only)

County Record Book Competition (Optional): All Record Books are due to the 4-H office by September 15th by 5pm.

Reminder: The point of keeping an Annual Project Report (APR) is for the members resource. It is a way to see if the project is profitable or if the member incurred a loss with the project. We should be teaching financial accountability in their project work.

It is strongly recommended that market project exhibitors have their APRs up-to-date before fair and have a good understanding of their investment in the project.

This year we would like to introduce the 2025-26 County Ambassadors – John Ammon and Abigail Hemphill.

The rank of 4-H Ambassador is quite an achievement. It requires that they be at least fourteen years old and hold the rank of a Gold Star in the program.

Gold star requirements are completion of eight projects (repeated years of the same projects counts), fifteen project skill activities, attending forty 4-H events, completing thirty leadership development activities and holding at least two significant leadership roles, participating in thirty community service activities, completing thirty six communication skills (which includes giving at least 10 presentations), receiving fifteen honors or awards and an optional requirement of having thirty healthy lifestyle activities.

It can take members their entire 4-H career to earn a Gold Star.

The application process to become an ambassador requires letters of reference, essay questions and an in-person interview. The goal is that the members will develop skills needed to interview for future scholarships and job opportunities.
